Other Highlights

Early Years Intervention

In the Early Years Intervention, summer camps were held on the theme of socio-emotional journey and Nature where many story books were read, and activities were conducted around the stories for the children. The community Outreach program held in Vikramgad included sessions for parents on school readiness. Multiple training programs were also conducted for teachers and mentors during this quarter.





Education

Training programs were also held for teachers and mentors in our Education Intervention. In Himachal Pradesh, infrastructure development projects such as multipurpose sheds, septic water tanks, repainting of school building, etc., were undertaken in several government schools to enhance the learning environment for students.



Special Care Centre

In our Special Care Centre Sign Language training was conducted for teachers of the Hearing-Impaired Section. Storytelling is one of the finest tools to help children learn better and the teachers of the Special Care Center participated in the storytelling session organized for them to enable them to use this tool effectively. In June, admissions for the new session also began for children with hearing impairment and intellectual disability. After a detailed baseline assessment of all new students, goals were set for each child accordingly.





Dhvani

Our Dhvani team conducted screening camps in the community and also at two maternity homes. Parent Empowerment workshops were conducted for children of our Dhvani and Special Care Centre on Care and maintenance of cochlear implants, Awareness about Occupational Therapy, and wireless technology for hearing aids.

Women Empowerment

Under our Anti-Human Trafficking Initiatives, our team concluded Phase 2 of its 'Prevention' project 'Strengthening Community-Based Protection Measures for Children At-Risk to Violence including Trafficking'. Phase 2 focussed on piloting a field-based intervention in 50 villages each across the Amravati and Nagpur districts of the Vidarbha region of Maharashtra. The intervention was supported by The Counter Trafficking Group [TCTG] and implemented in collaboration with the Department of Women and Child Development, Government of Maharashtra.



Trafficking for commercial sexual exploitation (CSE) is now not restricted to 'brothels' alone but has penetrated massage parlours, cyberspace, spas, and apartments. As a step towards countering the same through a multi-pronged, multi-stakeholder coordinated approach, a Divisional consultation was conducted under Alliance Against Centres of Trafficking (ACT) in collaboration with Maharashtra State Commission for Women (MSCW), in Nagpur. This was attended by over 400 stakeholders, which included the Police Department, District Government, NGOs, Child Welfare Committees, Legal Services Authority, etc. Hon. Shri Devendra Fadnavis, Dy. Chief Minister, Maharashtra, addressed the program along with Smt. Rupali Chakankar, Chairperson, MSCW, Shri. Amitesh Kumar IPS, Commissioner of Police, Nagpur, Dr. P.M Nair, IPS (Retired, DG, NDRF and Civil Defence, Govt. of India), along with other dignitaries who have dedicated their services to the cause.
